Did the Normans bring a truck load of trouble?


Using the work of historian Simon Schama. Students will consider the significance, change and continuity of the Norman invasion as well as the impact on England from the year 1066.

Students will explore the how enslaved people resisted enslavement from the British Empire.


An age of revolution


Would you have put Charles 1st to death?





Why was the Industrial Revolution so significant?

A study looking at Britain during the industrial revolution from 1750-1900. Students will use skills such as PANDA to form an informed judgement on its significance.



Students will also explore the role of sugar and gain further knowledge by looking at case studies of Mary Prince and Olaudah Equiano.





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World War One

Students will explore the causation of WW1, what the typical experience of a soldier was and the lasting impact of world war.

Post War Britain & the post war world

A two-part study. Students will explore the birth of the NHS, the Windrush scandal and Nottinghill carnival.

Students will then go on to study the birth of the United Nations, Human rights and the Cold War.
